Man with multiple DWI arrests in fatal accident

Fund for victim's family established by community

ERMA - A Philadelphia man with five drunk driving convictions, and who is awaiting trial on a sixth, was allegedly drunk again when his vehicle struck another car head on, killing a Lower Township man and injuring

two others. Police said on Saturday, Sept 12, at around 8:30 p.m., the Lower Township Police

Communications

Center received multiple the vehicles. 911 calls reporting a head on collision near the intersection of Bennett's Crossing and State Highway Route 9 in Patrol officers Erma. responding reported to a twocar, head-on collision with multiple victims and entrap-

Township The Lower Squad Rescue Paramedics along with Erma and Villas Fire Department were dispatched to the scene to assist with emergency medical treatment

Patrol officers, firefighters, and rescue personnel performed CPR on the driver of one of the vehicles, identified as Fredrick H. Shelton, 50, of the 300 block of State Highway Route 9, Erma, while the victim was still inside the vehicle.

Despite rescue efforts Shelton was pronounced dead at the scene by paramedics via telemetry at 8:44 p.m.

Lower Township Rescue Squad had three ambulances on the scene and requested

respond as well, however the nemcopters were zrounaea due to weather conditions. Lower Township Police

Accident Investigators then requested assistance from the Cape May Prosecutor's Office Fatal Accident Investigation Unit. Investigation on scene

determined that Shelton's vehicle, a green 1995 Ford Escort, was traveling south on Route 9 approaching the intersection of Bennett's Crossing. Passengers in his vehicle included his wife,

removal of the victims from two medevac helicopters to Sheri Shelton, 44, as a front Sheltons' 13-year-old daugn ter, Brittany, in the rear passenger seat.

At the same time John J Lawless, 37, of Caster Avenue, Philadelphia, was traveling northbound on Route 9 in a red 2000 Chrysler Sebring convertible. Lawless allegedly failed to negotiate a slight curve in the roadway at Bennett's Crossing and entered the southbound lane of Route 9

College looking at sealing buildings until rehab begins

NORTH CAPE MAY - Matt Altier, vice president of finance and administration at the Richard Stockton College said the college would soon be able to seal up buildings at the former Ponderlodge Golf Course while it was hammering out a lease agreement with the state.

Speaking to the Lower Township Chamber their Commerce September meeting, Altier said the process of writing a lease will still take many months, but the college is already taking steps to improve security on the site.

"We've been working with a security company, and our police chief (Stockton police) has been in contact with your police chief. We're looking at sealing the buildings against vandalism," he said.

Altier said once the lease agreement has been finalized they would be able to go in a to do "the real work," which is the rehabilitation of some of the existing buildings in order to create a satellite campus for environmental sciences.

Altier said the college was putting together a team of faculty and administration members to start planning a direction for the satellite campus. And he said although

the economy was bad, it was actually the right time to expand the college's environmental sciences department. One thing Altier said he

couldn't say was what the curriculum would be. "We'll keep you informed,"

he said. Altier said Stockton is continuing its efforts to be New Jersey's "Green College," and by the mid-1990s had already built the largest underground geothermal system in the world. The college is now attempting to cover its building and parking areas with solar panels.

"We just got a grant from
