She also served as Supervisor of Religious Services and Protestant Chaplain at Bayside State Prison, an adult male facility, where she developed and implemented several rehabilitative programs and began a Chapei Praise Band.

Rev. Terry received her from Princeton MDiv Theological Seminary and currently is enrolled in Drew Theological School's Doctor of Ministry program. She also holds an MA in English; Writing Creative from Temple University. Prior to entering the ministry, Rev. Terry had a career as both a college administrator and Poet-in-the-Schools as part of the NJ State Council on the Artist-in-Education Arts Program.

Jazz and writing are Rev. Terry's primary spiritual disciplines, and she actively promotes the arts in worship.

Rev. Terry is involved in the United Methodist Board of Discipleship's Open Source Liturgy Project and intends engage incarcerated Christians in the project. She and colleague Rev. Dr. Ronald Crouch are the cofounders of Art and Spirit, a consortium of artists who retreat monthly to make art and explore the convergence between creativity and spiri-

Rev. Terry has three chil-dren, Paul, Tara and Andrew, one granddaughter, Amelia, and a grandson due in late October. In addition, her godson, Andre is an active member of the family.


