The U.S. Coast Guard reported the 71foot scallop boat sank around 5 a.m. Tuesday, but they did not receive an alert from the boat's 406 MHz Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon until around 7:30 a.m. Three of the boat's seven crew members were pulled from the water about an hour
