


# **City Council reaches truce with Corea**

CAPE MAY – The city announced the results of a closed session meeting, Dec. 21, saying city council has reached an accord with city manager Luciano V. Corea on conditions for his staying in his post as the city's top administrator.

In a statement prepared by the city solicitor, the city announced, "The city council has also decided to retain Mr. Corea as city manager." "Obviously that's something I wanted – I enjoy what I'm doing," Corea said.

Corea said he was satisfied with the process saying he felt the five-member committee assembled to evaluate the city manager position gave him an objective evaluation.

"They pretty much confirmed I was doing a good job," Corea said. "There were some communication problems in the past but they can be overcome."

Councilman David Kurkowski said he looked forward to working with Corea. Kurkowski and Councilwoman Linda Steenrod, along with three community members, resident Suzanne Smigo, former mayor Thomas Phelan, and former police chief Robert Boyd, comprised the committee charged with evaluating Corea and the position of city manager.

"I thought the process worked very well," Kurkowski said. "We talked to over 100 people in Cape May representing a variety of parts of the community – year 'round and seasonal resi-

dents, those who were active in politics, those who are quiet, business owners, and city employees."

"We thought it was a very comprehensive way of approaching this decision," Kurkowski said.

The committee also met with the remaining council members, Councilman David Craig, Deputy Mayor Niels Favre and Mayor Jerry Inderweis and the city manager.

According to the statement issued by the city the committee did not make recommendations on whether to retain Corea as the city manager, nor did it recommend the term of his new contract, which will be negotiated over the next three months. Kurkowski confirmed both of those statements, saying all parties expect contract negotiations will be successfully completed over the next several months.

Some doubt had been cast on whether or not Corea's contract would be renewed, especially after lifeguard

#### JANUARY Lower Cape May boys basketball posts rare win over Middle

ERMA – On Tuesday, Jan. 4, the Lower Cape May boys

#### Cape May Elementary to reduce staff

CAPE MAY – After evaluating the school budget, which has been capped due to S-1701, the Cape May City Elementary School Board of Education, on Jan. 12, directed the superintendent to make the cuts, resulting in two full time teachers being cut. The plan was to eliminate

one second grade teacher, one third grade teacher and a fifth grade teacher, while adding a fourth grade teacher for a net reduction of two. Another teacher went from full time to part time.

#### **Cape May won't drop Section 8 duties**

CAPE MAY – The city of Cape May decided to continue to offer residents in-house help with Section 8 procedures, rather than turn the process over to the state, after city council decided it wanted to continue providing the service to city residents. At its Jan. 17 meeting, city council tabled Resolution 17-01-2006, which would have entered the city into an agreement with the state Department of Community Affairs and the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

#### County votes to support Ponderlodge acquisition


