Smoking ban fails in Cape May due to tie vote

CAPE MAY - A proposed ordinance banning smok-ing on Cape May beaches, in parks and on the promenade in Cape May failed to pass as a shorthanded council split

voted against the ordinance while Deputy Mayor Jack Wichterman, who initiated the smoking ban ordinance, and Councilman William Murray voted in favor.

Deanna Councilwoman Fiocca was absent.

in the council meeting room, Monday night, as Cape May residents and non-residents

wished to voice their opinions during public comment on the ordinance. Most who spoke Monday were against the ordi-nance, many of whom said it would hurt the local economy by driving summer tourists away, especially Canadian visitors. Statistically, a higher percentage of Canadians are smokers.

John Cooke, President of the Chamber of Commerce of Greater Cape May said he and the chamber's board of directors objected to the smoking ban ordinance.

"While smoking and second hand smoke are serious health concerns, especially indoors, Cape May should not be in the business of telling visitors how to live," he said. "Cape May should be

in the business of providing all visitors with an enjoyable and safe environment. The Chamber of Commerce members want visitors to enjoy their stay, free of overbearing rules and regulations."

Mickey McGlade, owner of the McGlade's on the Beach, said her customers currently use the promenade to smoke because they are not permitted to smoke in her restaurant. She said if the ordinance passed, they would have to cross Beach Avenue to have a cigar or cigarette since her restaurant is located on the beachfront.

NORTH CAPE MAY - Ron Stenlake said he truly appreciates the recognition and support given to veterans and current military personnel, because those he served with were rarely shown respect when they came home.

Stenlake spent six years in the Navy during the Vietnam War. He said when troops came back from the war they were generally ridiculed, spit on and called cruel names as soon as they got off the plane.

"As soon as you came home, you wanted to be in civilian clothes so no one would know you were in the mili-tary," he said. "Patriotism has improved 1,000 percent since then."

BID chairman, wife charged

CAPE MAY - The chairman of the Washington Street Mall Management Company and his wife were scheduled to be in Cape May Municipal court today to answer to charges of criminal mischief and theft.

Steve Smarro resigned Nov. 7 as board of trustees chairman for the Business Improvement District (BID). The Washington Street Mall Management Company is the name of the nonprofit corporation that manages the BID.

Smarro's resignation came after he and wife Pam, owners of Madame's Port, 311 Washington Street (Mall), were the subjects of a citizen's complaint citing criminal mischief and theft.

Mike Slawek, owner of the Ugly Mug Bar and Restaurant, 426 Washington St., filed the complaint with the Cape May Police Department after a sign advertising a prime rib

from the side of his building. According to Slawek, two subjects alleged to be Steve and Pam Smarro were caught on video and still camera taking down the approximately 3'x7 sign on the Decatur Street side of the building. Slawek said the sign was removed Nov. 3 at around 8 p.m.

Slawek said the cameras were installed because vandalism has been an ongoing problem on that side of the building for the past couple

"We have a menu board on the big barrel (end) on that side of the building, and we've been getting vandalism before 9 p.m.," he said.

Slawek said someone has come in their side door on several occasions and kicked the pipes away from the urinal and torn the sink off the

"Normally, if that kind of thing would happen it would be 1 a.m. in the summer, not

dinner special was torn down before 9 p.m.," he said.

Slawek said they were constantly dealing with someone taking their menus off the menu boards or laying their menu boards on the ground. Letters have been removed from that side of the building.

Slawek said he had the cameras installed and he figured they would catch a kid, who would be slapped on the wrist and told not to do it anymore.

"Low and behold it was the chairman of the BID," Slawek

Slawek described the actions of the two individuals in the video.

"One is looking out, then one pulls a little off. Then they look in the window," he said.

Slawek said this behavior is repeated several times until the persons in the video remove the sign entirely and carry it into the Pilot House, next door.
